

"SURVEYING IN AUTODESK CIVIL AND CIVIL 3D 2010"

Mr. Bonenfant has been a part of the Surveying and Civil Engineering business for 25 years in many different capacities. He began as a chainman on a construction crew in 1983 and worked his way through the surveying industry by holding every position from there to Survey Manager in charge of 6 field crews by 1993. In 1993, Mr. Bonenfant moved into the design side of Civil Engineering. He spent the next couple of years designing a number of different projects in both

residential and commercial areas as well as becoming registered as a Land Surveyor in South Carolina.

In 1995, Mr. Bonenfant moved into software training and support for a local reseller of Autodesk products. Since then he has been training and supporting Autodesk's Surveying and Civil Engineering products, either as an Applications Engineer for an Autodesk Reseller or an Autodesk Authorized AEC Consultant. Mr. Bonenfant has written four manuals the 2000 release of Land Development Desktop, Civil Design and Survey, portions of which are still in use by Autodesk today. During this period, Mr. Bonenfant provided training and support services for Autodesk, as well as Autodesk Resellers. In the aftermath of 9/11, Mr. Bonenfant returned to his design and surveying background. During this period, he was involved in several large and high profile design projects as well as many small to midsized residential design and surveying projects. Being involved again in the design process allowed him to develop new design and surveying processes based on the new Civil 3D product. Now, after 5 years of varied design and surveying experiences, Mr. Bonenfant returns to the dealer channel as an Application Engineer for Duncan Parnell, Inc. Mr. Bonenfant is an experienced trainer and will be providing traditional classroom based training using the Autodesk AOTC courseware. He will also be creating custom training material for Duncan Parnell designed to be delivered in a standard classroom, On-site, on-demand and via the World Wide Web.

- Import various types of data and cover the techniques used to create automated linework.
- Import and balance a simple traverse using Transit, Compass, or Crandall rules for traverse analysis.
- Cover the requirements of balancing the same traverse using Least Squares adjustments.
- Cover the reporting used by these methods of adjustment.
- Convert raw data using Survey Link and import it into Civil 3D using a template with numeric codes as its base.
- Import a small lot survey using Trimble link and complete the drafting for a lot survey.
- Create a small subdivision and label the parcel lines and parcel areas.

SC COUNCIL OF ENGINEERING AND SURVEYING

SOCIETIES: Mr. Carl Bostick stated that the Council has been monitoring a few bills in the House and Senate and also looking at qualification based selection process. Council will be meeting again soon. Members on this council have staggered terms for replacement.

NSPS: Mr. Henry Dingle reported that the spring meeting of the NSPS was held February 19-23 in Salt Lake City, Utah in conjunction with the ACSM 2009 Conference. New NSPS President is Mr. John Matonich from Michigan. Mr. Dingle reported on items discussed at the Board of Governors meeting: 3% Withholding Tax Update; Infrastructure Stimulus news; Dept. of Labor Professional Exemption Issue; FEMA news and National GIS Proposal. Railroad Monumentation: A bill is being prepared to require railroad right-of-ways to be monumented to preserve the right-of-ways. NCEES now has a program which allows professional and educational information to be sent to other states to expedite your registration for comity. You must register for this service and pay a fee. B. P. Barber was presented one of the awards for Subdivision Mapping of the NSPS National Plat contest.

GPS/VRS: Mr. Bobby Foster reported that the Pickens VRS site is up and running now. Discussion from the group followed on making sure due diligence is done before working on a job for accuracy.

Insurance: Chairman Dennis Clinkscales reported that our general liability insurance has been raised to 2 million. The committee is also looking into Directors and Officers insurance in the near future.

MINUTES OF SCSPLS GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING (CONT

Legal and Legislative: Mr. Ben Christensen introduced Mr. Joe Jones who submitted a written report and made an oral report as well. Ben Christensen and Bobby Foster were at the House LCI Real Estate Subcommittee Hearing Thursday, March 5, 2009. Jan Simpson, SC State Board of Registration for Professional Engineers and Surveyors Administrator, reported, "The House LCI subcommittee adjourned debate on the Engineer Regulations Thursday morning as a procedural formality. The subcommittee's concerns focused on the Board's proposal to remove caps on fees in 49-103. Knowing that, the Registration Board had already arranged to reinstate the cap to allay their concerns." Susan Duncan, LLR Lobbyist is meeting Thursday afternoon with Legislative Council to get that revision done, so we can withdraw and resubmit almost simultaneously so as not to lose any time. The LCI subcommittee does not need to meet again to reconsider the revised regulations; they will them go on to full Committee after the "switch-out." The regulations were pulled March 5, 2009 and resubmitted with the agreed upon language the same day. The regulation's expiration date is May 16, 2009. If no action is taken or if the regulations are not sent back to the Registration Board, they will be accepted and have the same effect as a law.

The Statute of Repose Law (Tort Reform Bill S.350 and H.3489; Statue of Repose, S, C. Code 15-3-670) is being threatened by a House Bill introduced by Rep. Bakari T. Sellers (D-Bamberg) on Feb. 17, 2009. This bill threatens the state's statute of repose for all involved in the construction industry, including engineers, architects, surveyors and contractors. If the bill passes the statute of repose "would not apply to any action brought by the State of South Carolina or for its benefit." In other words, every construction, survey, engineering report, engineering design, architectural design or construction project done for the state would be subject to a law suit for ever. Such a bill would be the total unraveling of the statute of repose that many have worked to cut to eight years and to project. Furthermore, projects that have been completed, even back to the 1970s and earlier that would now be fair game and all of the professionals that worked on them. Under fair and equal protection, if this bill passed, then it would possibly nullify the statute of repose for private structures and all those projects completed for political subdivisions. The South Carolina Civil Justice Coalition has joined with its construction, engineering and architectural members to actively oppose this bill. Nevertheless, ACEC-SC, SCSPLS and SCSPE members should be aware of this bill and be prepared to help defeat this bill if

it begins to show life. Currently, it is in the House Judiciary

Group also discussed False Claim Act, and DOT Plan Library. Software is available now for SCDOTright-of-way plans, but public has no direct access to these plans at present. Motion made by Mr. Burnett Jenkins that a letter be written by the Society to the DOT explaining the benefits and needs for surveyors to have access to these plans. Mr. Al Whitworth seconded the motion; approved with no opposition.

Membership: The membership at present is 540 members. Two Emeritus approved: Warren P. Jenkins - previous Emeritus member renewing for 08-09; Carol B. Baughman – previous

Emeritus member renewing for 08-09.

Newsletter: Mr. Dale Swygert reported that the February newsletter has been printed and mailed and final issue will be sent before the convention.

Past President's Council: Mr. Bobby Foster reported that the Council will be meeting at the convention. He made a suggestion that the Council meet at each general membership meeting in the future. Topics of discussion will be growing new board members and guide to making changes for the future.

Plat Contest: Mr. Dale Swygert reported that the plats this year will be sent to him for his committee to judge. Winners will be announced at the convention.

Public Relations: Chairman Chuck Dawley spoke on Surveyors Week and Governor's Proclamation, OCRM permitting process and the Coastal Chapter meeting at which a member of the legislature spoke on the process of presenting Bills and passing of Bills.

ROD Liaison: Mr. Al Whitworth reported that there is no money allocated for any meetings of the ROD committee at present.

S. C. State Parks: Mr. Mike Culler submitted a written report stating the following: Kings Mountain State Park – No change from November 21, 2008 report; Myrtle Beach State Park - Completed; Paris Mountain State Park - Bobby Foster stated that Buckhorn will be closed all next year and will also discuss the park survey with the current ranger. Mr. Foster suggested that possibly while Buckhorn is closed next year, a group of our state members could come up for the weekend to locate corners of the park for a point to start surveying lines which might have encroachments; Santee State Park – No change from November 21, 2008 report.; Sesquicentennial State Park - Joe McIntyre reported that all lines are marked and flagged where there appears to be encroachments. These areas are along Subdivision boundary lines and should not require any further surveying. Mr. Henry Dingle reported that since we have been working on this project since 2004 and felt we need to finalize the surveys and end this project by next year. Many in the group agreed and suggested that each chapter working on the projects try to finalize soon.

Scholarship: Mr. Burnett Jenkins reported that ticket sales are poor at present and only one-half of the expenses have been covered. He encouraged Chapters to push sale of these tickets until the convention when the drawing will take place.

Survey Contest: Upper Piedmont Chapter will be in charge of the survey games at the convention.

Surveyor of the Year: Mr. Dale Swygert reported on the rules and regulations for Surveyor of the Year which will be printed in the newsletter, accessed on the SCSPLS website and announced at the convention.

Trade Show: The February Trade show was a big success with paying booths and complimentary booths. Vendors who exhibited at this February conference will be allowed to have a table-top booth free of charge at the President's Reception at the convention.

Website: Mr. Dale Swygert reported that he has updated some items on the website and will work on a calendar and chapter sites. He suggested that all chapters send him information on

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Legislative Report

Joe S. Jones, Lobbyist

The 2009 General Assembly has been quite different this session. The House and Senate have taken more furloughs this session than in modern times. The saving to the state is about \$50,000 per day when they furlough themselves.

Of course the savings to the State may be important to the budget, but another advantage to the fewer days spent in Columbia means a lot of legislation is not moving, which may be good or bad, depending upon your issues.

As for surveyors' interest, overall the furloughs have been good. There is a bill in the House of Representatives that would have removed the statute of repose for all government work. That bill is not going anywhere this year; however, we will have to watch it next session to be sure it does not move.

The Engineer and Surveyor Regulations are in good shape. The House Labor Commerce and Industry Committee (LCI) chose not to bring them from subcommittee to the full committee but are allowing the 120-day deadline to pass without action.

The Senate LCI took testimony in a subcommittee where Joe Jones, Jan Simpson (Registration Board Administrator) and Bob Sellman (Labor Licensing and Regulation) testified and answered questions from the Senators. A full LCI meeting was scheduled for mid April but was cancelled. The regulations were

on that agenda; another meeting has not been scheduled. The Senate committee may simply let the 120 deadline pass without further action as well.

Tort Reform, which was introduced in the House and Senate, has been purposely set aside until next January. The House and Senate leadership have agreed to use the interim between this session and the next to give the legislation a full airing with the intention for action in January, 2010.

The False Claims Act has not moved this session, but the engineering/surveying and the SC Civil Justice Coalition are watching it carefully. The False Claims Act, if passed, is potentially harmful to businesses because it creates an incentive for lawsuits to target companies that do business with the government. It is in the Senate Judiciary Committee.

SCSPLS has been working on an issue outside the State House. SCSPLS and the SC Council of Engineering and Surveying Societies have petitioned SCDOT Secretary Tony Chapman to allow surveyors, engineers and other licensed professionals access to SCDOT information via the Internet. Letters from both groups have been written and received by Mr. Chapman, and we are awaiting a decision from the SCDOT.

Proposed Changes to Regulations

This is an update on "proposed" Regulations for the Board of Engineers and Surveyors:

As of this writing, it appears the proposed Regulations will "time out" on May 16, meaning the legislature is going to let them become law without further committee/legislative review. However, they are not really "law" until they are published in the State Register which will not happen until the end of June. LLR will publish the final version on our web site.

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

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
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Summer Safety

When working in the hot summer months, outdoor workers need to protect themselves from the sun, heat and many other hazards that come along with the season. Both employers and employees need to understand the possible hazards that surround their workplace and how to prevent and manage them. According to OSHA, every employer and employee should be aware of these five summertime hazards:

- Sun Exposure
- Heat
- Lyme Disease/Tick-Borne Diseases
- West Nile Virus
- Poison Ivy/Related Plants

Sun can happen anytime of the year. Working out in the sun day after day puts surveyors at risk for many types of skin cancer, yet many fail to make sun protection part of their safety routine. Each day, field surveyors are exposed to the sun dehydration, sun stroke, snakes, etc., but in most cases, sun protection, skin care and skin cancer identification is hardly mentioned. Each morning equipment safety check includes first sun protection, hard hat, safety glasses, steel toe boots, and any other gear that is necessary to perform the work. Some ways to shield the sun are:

- Make sure the body is covered up. Wear loose-fitting, long clothing.
- Make sure to wear at least 30 SPF.
- Wear a wide brim hat that will cover the whole head.
- Protect the eyes with UV absorbent sunglasses.
- Try to limit exposure as much as possible. UV rays are most intense between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

One of the biggest threats during the summer months is the heat. When combined with humidity, the health threats posed are even more serious. Heat stress can result in heat stroke, heat exhaustion, heat cramps, or heat rashes. Heat can also increase the risk of injuries in workers as it may result in sweaty palms, fogged-up safety glasses, and dizziness. Here's how to minimize the risk to heat:

- Drink small amounts of water multiple times a day.
- Wear light-colored and loose fitting clothing.
- Eat smaller meals.
- Take frequent breaks.
- · Avoid caffeine.
- Ask a health-care provider if certain medications could affect one's reaction to the heat.

Worksites with woods, bushes, high grass, or leaf litter are likely to have more ticks. Outdoor workers should be extra careful to protect themselves in the late spring and summer when young ticks are most active. Lyme disease and other illnesses are transmitted by bacteria from bites of infected deer ticks. In most cases, the victims will see a "bulls-eye" rash and experience flu-like symptoms. For more information on tick removal go to: http://www.cdc.gov/ticks/tick_removal.html Protect yourself with these precautions by:

- Wearing light colors will allow the tick to stand out better.
- Wear long sleeves and tuck pants into boots.
- Cover feet completely.
- Make sure to wear a hat.
- Use tick repellants.
- Shower right after work and wash clothes at a high temperature.
- Examine body after work. If one is spotted, remove it with fine-tipped tweezers.

The health effects of stinging or biting insects or scorpions range from mild discomfort or pain to a lethal reaction for those workers allergic to the insect's venom. Anaphylactic shock is the body's severe allergic reaction to a bite or sting and requires immediate emergency care. Thousands of people are stung by insects each year, and as many as 90–100 people in the United States die as a result of allergic reactions. This number may be underreported as deaths may be mistakenly diagnosed as heart attacks or sunstrokes or may be attributed to other causes. West Nile virus is transmitted by a bite from an infected mosquito. There are mild and severe symptoms. Mild symptoms include fever, headache, body ache, skin rash and swollen lymph glands. Severe symptoms include high fever, neck stiffness, stupor, disorientation, coma, tremors, convulsions, muscle weakness and paralysis. Remember these precautions:

- Apply insect repellent with DEET or Picaridin.
- Spray clothes with repellents containing DEET or permethrin, a common synthetic chemical used as an insect repellent. Do NOT spray permethrin directly on exposed skin.
- Wear long sleeves and long pants.
- Be alert at dusk and dawn when the mosquitoes are most active

Poison ivy, along with poison oak and poison sumac, has poisonous sap in their roots, stems and leaves. About 85% of the general population are allergic to these plants and, if exposed, will develop a rash on the affect area. Although over-the-counter topical medications may relieve symptoms for most people, immediate medical attention may be required for severe reactions, particularly when exposed to the smoke from burning these poisonous plants. Burning these poisonous plants can be very dangerous because the allergens can be inhaled, causing lung irritation. To try and reduce the risks of exposure follow these precautions:

- Wear long sleeves, pants and gloves.
- Apply barrier creams to exposed skin.
- Educate workers to identify the plants.
- Educate workers on signs and symptoms.
- Keep rubbing alcohol on hand. It removes the oily resin up to 30 minutes after exposure.



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
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
